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Vendors signing up for OMC's Nov. 6 yard sale

Ord Military Community's next Post-Wide Yard Sale will be held on Saturday Nov. 6, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Registration is being conducted in the Mayoral Program Office at OMC's General Stilwell Community Center from 6 to 7:30 p.m. on the following days: Oct. 19, 21, 26 and 28 and Nov. 2 and 4. Registration will not be conducted by telephone or at any other place or times.

Vendor spaces are assigned on a first-come, first-served basis.

The vendor fee is \$10 per space for active-duty service members and service family members who reside at OMC or the Presidio of Monterey. The fee is \$15 per space for all others, including active-duty service members who reside off post, Department of Defense employees and military retirees.

Military identification will be required at registration.

PLACES ON THE PRESIDIO: Taylor Hall (Building 616) -- Named in honor of Lt. Robert F. Taylor, USN, (1938-1969), who was a 1968 graduate of the Russian Basic Course. Lt. Taylor died with 30 other crew members aboard an EC-121 surveillance aircraft that was shot down by North Korean MiGs. Taylor Hall was built in 1987.



For kids, parents, motorists

For a happy Halloween, heed these safety tips

Halloween is an exciting, fun-filled time for young people. Unfortunately, it can also result in tragedy. The following safety tips are offered for parents, children and motorists to help make Halloween a safe event for all.

Recommended hours for trick-or-treating: 5 to 8 p.m.

Tips for adults:

- Welcome trick-or-treaters with your porch lights turned on and any exterior lights turned on.
- Coordinate with your neighbors and patrol your neighborhood streets occasionally to discourage speeding motorists, acts of malicious mischief and crimes against children.
- Set a trick-or-treat time limit for your children.
- An adult should accompany any children under eight years of age.
- Instruct children never to eat anything until they have returned home and the treats have been examined.
- Cut and wash fruit before eating.
- Discard anything unwrapped.
- Check the wrappers of commercial treats for tampering. Police officers will inspect any candy or treats upon request.
- Report any suspicious or unusual activity immediately to the police department.

Tips for motorists:

- Exercise extreme caution when driving a vehicle.
- Be on the alert for excited youngsters whose vision might be restricted because they are wearing masks.

Tips for trick-or-treaters:

- Do not accept rides from strangers.
- Carry a flashlight and use it when crossing streets.
- Cross only at street corners, never between parked cars and never diagonally across an intersection.
- Look in all directions before crossing a street and obey all traffic lights.
- Walk -- never run -- across streets.
- Walk on sidewalks, not on streets.
- Never trick-or-treat alone. Have at least two buddies with you for the entire evening.
- Do not go inside anyone's home. Remain on the porch at all times.
- Do not take short cuts through backyards, alleys or parks.
- Trick-or-treat only in your neighborhood and only on well-lit streets. Daylight hours are best.

Tips about your child's costume:

- Make sure your child's costume is not flammable.
- Show your child how to roll on the ground if the costume accidentally catches fire. In case of fire, do not run, as this makes the fire spread more rapidly.
- Your child should have at least one hand free at all times to avoid injury in case of a fall.
- Make sure that your child's mask does not restrict his or her vision and that it has adequate breathing holes.
- For a disguise, it is better to use non-allergenic makeup instead of a mask.
- Use reflective tape or reflective material for costumes.
- Swords, knives and other such accessories should be of soft or flexible material.

Tips on examining candy:

- Instruct your child not to consume any candy or food or beverage until he or she has returned home and it has been inspected by adults.
- Accept only professionally wrapped candy. Discard all candies that are not wrapped or that have wrapping that appears to have been opened or punctured.

Americans across the country are now voting in presidential state primaries, but many soldiers can't make it to the polls. Members of the uniformed services or merchant marine and their family members may vote absentee while away from their place of voting residence, wherever stationed, inside or outside the United States. For members of the uniformed services and their family members, in most states the legal voting residence is defined as where they have, or have had, physical presence at the location and the intent to remain or return.

The 2004 elections officially began with the District of Columbia Presidential Preference Primary on Jan. 13, 2004. Primary elections play an important role in the electoral process. The names that will appear on the general election ballot on Nov. 2, 2004, are the candidates who were chosen during the primary election process. Voter participation is crucial in any election and primaries are no different. Because dates for both presidential and state primaries are spread throughout the year, be sure to consult your Unit Voting Assistance Officer.

The Department of Defense Voting Assistance Program aims to ensure that soldiers, members of their families and Department of Defense civilians overseas can exercise their right to vote. In order to register and/or vote absentee, an eligible U.S. citizen must carefully and accurately complete a Federal Post Card Application (FPCA) and then submit it to the proper election official.

All states and territories prescribe two voter requirements:

- A voter must be a citizen of the United States on the date of the election in which he or she wishes to vote.
- A voter must be at least 18 years old on election day. (Some states permit 17-year-olds to vote in primary elections if he or she will be 18 by the date of the general election.)

Department of Defense policy is to encourage and aid all voters to vote in federal, state and local elections. When practicable and compatible with military operations, all voters will be given the chance to register and vote in any election for which their state of voting residence has made absentee voting possible.

Army Emergency Relief offers loans for auto upkeep

Army Emergency Relief recognizes that postponing necessary maintenance on privately owned vehicles (oil changes, tune-ups, brake and tire replacement, etc.) can lead to costly auto repairs at a later date. By offering assistance to soldiers for POV maintenance, AER contributes to road safety and helps soldiers extend the lives of their POVs.

To qualify for assistance, a soldier must be eligible to repay the assistance by allotment. Replacement items will be standard equipment for the vehicle. (Upgrades, such as custom tires, etc., are not authorized.) This assistance is not available to members of the National Guard or Reserves on active duty. This assistance is on a loan basis. No grants are authorized.



Big overhaul of check-cashing system New law will enable banks to process checks electronically at accelerated speed

Time is running out for all who rely on the "float," the one- to five-day lag between the time they write their checks and when their banks withdraw the money from their accounts.

A new federal law that enables banks to process checks electronically goes into effect on Oct. 28. That will cut the float time on out-of-town checks to 24 hours in many cases. The new law, called "Check 21," is a sweeping overhaul of the check-cashing system.

If you are a die-hard check floater, consult with officials at your bank on when your bank will implement the new electronic system. Many banks lack the software needed for electronic check processing. Also ask your bank officials when they will start charging bounced-check fees for the checks undergoing the new accelerated processing. Banks notify customers by mail and website postings.

Aside from bank fees, the California bad check law can take a second bite at you.

California Civil Code Section 1719 says: "Any person who passes a check on insufficient funds shall be liable to the payee for the amount of the check and a service charge payable to the payee not to exceed \$25 for the first check, and \$35 per check for each subsequent check to that payee." If the bad-check writer fails to pay the face amount of the check and the service charge, he or she could be liable to the payee for triple damages. Those damages shall not be less than \$100.

You can stave off a rash of unexpected bank and civil overdraft penalties. It's simple. Don't write checks for amounts you don't have. That's just good personal finance discipline. Maintain adequate funds and keep track of your records.

EO or EEO?

What's the difference?

Equal Opportunity (EO) is a military program. Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO) is a civilian program.

Laws/Regulations:

EO: AR 600-20

EEO: Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended; Age Discrimination in Employment Act of 1967; Rehabilitation Act of 1973; 29 CFR 1614; AR 690-600.

Serviced population:

EO: Military personnel and family members.

EEO: Civilian employees, former employees and applicants for employment.

Types of issues that constitute a complaint:

EO: Discrimination and sexual harassment on/off duty, on/off installation.

EEO: Issues must be tied to employment, while on duty or in official capacity.

Processing procedures:

EO: Normal complaints must be filed within 60 days. Investigation is conducted by the appropriate commander or an investigating officer. Decision on findings is made by the Garrison Commander. Appeal may be filed within seven days after decision has been made. Final decision is made by the Installation Commander, Presidio of Monterey. Follow-up is done by the Installation Equal Opportunity Adviser.

EEO: Complaints must be filed within 45 days of the time the individual became aware that management's action or lack of action was due to discrimination. Pre-complaint counseling is done by DA-trained and certified EEO counselors. Mediation is offered by DA-trained and certified mediators. If not resolved, the complaint may be elevated to a formal complaint and referred for investigation to the Office of Complaint Investigations (OCI). After investigation, the complaint may be elevated to the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC), which will assign an administrative judge (AJ) and may set a date for a hearing. The AJ's decision may be appealed to the EEOC, Office of Federal Operations. The decision on appeal may be elevated to US District Court.

Costs:

EO: No basis to determine cost.

EEO: \$80,000 per complaint during the administrative process; compensatory damages; attorney fees.

Average processing time:

EO: 30 to 60 days.

EEO: 2 to 3 years.

What to do when your pet is PCSing

Many students and staff members are assigned to DLIFLC or the Naval Postgraduate School for a relatively short time and when they relocate those who are or may be going to Hawaii end up with added stress when pets travel with them. Recent changes in the Hawaii Rabies Quarantine Policy make it possible for your pet to be released from quarantine in five days or less (some even being released from the airport). This is opposed to the 30- or 120-day quarantine process, both of which are stressful to family and pets alike, and additional costs could be as much as \$ 900 for the extra time in quarantine. This can be avoided with a small amount of preparation on the departure side.

- The first step for any carnivore is to have two rabies vaccines (one- or three-year rabies vaccine) given at least 12 months apart, age permitting, with
 - 12 months or less prior to entry if it was a one-year rabies vaccine or
 - 18 months or less prior to entry if it was a three-year rabies vaccine, and
 - No less than 90 days prior to entry to the state of Hawaii.

A veterinarian must collect blood to submit for OIE-FAVN serum results with sufficient level of rabies antibodies (the Presidio of Monterey Veterinary Treatment Facility can assist with the blood collection and test submission). There is a mandatory 120-day pre-

arrival waiting period between the time the lab receives the blood and the earliest date the pet may enter the state. This test is good for 18 months and costs \$35. The pet must have at the time the blood is drawn a microchip ID. If the pet does not have one, one can be implanted at the time the blood is drawn.

All other vaccines must be up-to-date prior to leaving and a health certificate must be issued 10 days or less from the date of travel. Documents and payment are due more than 10 days prior to arrival (allow extra time for delivery). All documents as well as a checklist are available at http://www.hawaiiag.org/hdoa/ai_aqs_info.htm. Any other questions can be directed to your local Veterinary Treatment Facility at 831/ 242-7718.

MWR Hawaii has set up an animal boarding facility due to the large number of personnel now able to do the five-day or less quarantine with limited housing availability. Personnel arriving and departing on PCS orders have first priority. Any questions about availability or reservations can be directed to the MWR Hawaii boarding facility at 808/368-3456.

Many countries have quarantine procedures that service members need to be aware of. If you are on PCS orders or think you may receive PCS orders for an overseas assignment, call the Presidio of Monterey Veterinary Treatment Facility at (831) 242-7718 as soon as possible so you can ensure an easy PCS for your pet.

eArmy U courses offered Army-wide

The eArmyU eCourse enrollment option became available to enlisted active-duty soldiers beginning on Oct. 1. In eCourse enrollments, soldiers use their personal computers to participate in eArmyU on a course-by-course basis. There is no service-remaining requirement with the eCourse option. However, soldiers must have sufficient time remaining in service to complete the eArmyU course in which they are enrolling. Tuition assistance is available on a course-by-course basis subject to approval by the education counselor and the soldier's commander. The Army's goal is to have 80,000 soldiers enrolled by 2005.

eArmyU participation

Soldiers have access to 146 certificate and degree programs offered by 29 accredited colleges and universities. Once enrolled, soldiers receive tuition, books and course fees up to \$250 per semester-hour credit and with an annual ceiling of \$4,500. Enrollees also receive an e-mail account and free online access through an Army Web portal at the eArmyU Web site. To participate, soldiers must be active-duty or active Guard or reserve, must be eligible for favorable personnel action, must have a high school diploma or GED, must meet a home institution's admission criteria and must have concurrent enrollment approval from his or her commander and an ACES counselor. Laptop computers are also provided as a reenlistment incentive for soldiers willing to reenlist for duty in combat forces/operational units as defined by senior army leadership.

Laptop option

With the program's expansion to the entire Army, the eArmyU "Technology Pack" or "laptop" option will be offered solely as a retention and readiness tool in support of Army Transformation and the Army Campaign Plan by encouraging reenlistment into combat forces/operational units. Laptop program enrollees will receive a state-of-the-art laptop and will be required to successfully complete 12 semester hours in three years (instead of the current two years). Soldiers must have three years time-in-service remaining at the time of program enrollment and must have

12 ways to stay healthy during cold and flu season

1. Always wash hands thoroughly with soap and warm water after coughing, sneezing, blowing your nose, playing and using bathroom.

2. If using a public restroom, use a clean paper towel to open the door in case persons before you failed to wash their hands.

3. Always wash hands before eating.

4. If possible, avoid close contact with individuals who are ill.

5. Avoid eating and drinking after someone who is ill.

6. Encourage children not to share food at school.

7. Encourage children to use tissue to blow nose and sneeze into, especially at school.

8. Encourage children to wash their hands at school during breaks and before lunch.

9. If your child has a fever, keep them out of day-care or school. This helps protect other children and staff members from getting ill and bringing the illness home to their families.

10. Disinfect toys, door handles, and other surfaces frequently touched by family members.

11. If your healthcare provider tells you that you have a virus, don't ask for antibiotics. Antibiotics do not help with viruses. If antibiotics are required for a non-viral infection, complete the entire dosing regimen. Do not save antibiotics for future illnesses.

12. Alcohol-based hand gels and anti-microbial hand gels are good disinfectants to use if you are unable to wash your hands.

Clinic Services include acute care (for sudden illness or injury) and routine care (for other health issues) for active-duty service members currently stationed in Monterey and the surrounding area.

Hours for clinic services (including laboratory and pharmacy): Monday, Tuesday Wednesday and Friday, 7:15 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Thursday, 7:15 a.m. to 12 noon

Sick Call appointments: Call 242-5741 from 6:30 to 9 a.m. for a same-day appointment (for suddenly illness, injury or other medical care that cannot be delayed). These appointments are with family practice doctors or physician assistants.

Sick Call sign-in: Between the hours of 7:15 and 9 a.m. active-duty service members who are unable to obtain an appointment by telephone may come to the clinic to be screened or triaged for a same-day appointment. Service members who come to the clinic outside these hours will be triaged and receive care based on the urgency of their condition. What you need to know about West Nile Virus

West Nile virus was recently found in birds in Monterey County. Since the virus was introduced into the United States several years ago there have been thousands of human cases of this disease. Since 1999 WNV has spread slowly across the entire country and is now considered to be permanently established in North America.

It is here to stay.

What is WNV?

How is it transmitted?

How dangerous is the illness?

What are the symptoms?

What is the treatment?

How can you protect yourself from WNV?

WNV is a virus that affects many species of birds and mammals. It is transmitted by bites from infected mosquitoes. The *Culex* species of mosquito is the predominant vector in the United States and it is most active at dawn and dusk. It is possible to contract the disease from contaminated blood transfusions, although this rarely occurs. You cannot get WNV from direct contact with infected humans or animals.

Many species of birds, especially crows, are very susceptible to WNV, hence the concern over finding unusual numbers of dead or dying birds. In humans, most WNV infections are so mild as to not cause symptoms. Twenty percent of those infected will feel ill for three to 14 days after receiving an infected bite.

For the vast majority of those who develop symptoms, WNV is a mild to moderate flu-like illness characterized by fever, headache, muscle aches, swollen glands, nausea and vomiting, malaise and a slight rash lasting one or two weeks. In about one in 100-150 cases, severe symptoms, including paralysis, meningitis, altered mental status and death can occur. Most of these cases are in persons over 50 or with impaired immune systems.

There is no specific treatment for WNV except for supportive measures.

Antibiotics do not help. It is advisable to seek medical care for flu-like symptoms lasting more than a few days and immediately for more severe symptoms. Since there is no specific treatment, tests for diagnosing WNV are only done with extremely sick patients requiring hospitalization.

The best way to deal with WNV is prevention. A human vaccine for WNV is not yet available, but there are measures one can take to reduce risk of infection.

Mosquitoes are more prone to bite during their breeding season, usually during warm wet weather.

Getting rid of trash that holds stagnant water, emptying water cans, cleaning out rain gutters, frequently changing bird bath water and improving yard drainage are among some of the measures that reduce mosquito breeding grounds.

Where practical, a combination of biological controls and spraying is also helpful.

Avoid outside activity during dawn and dusk and stay away from swampy areas.

If you do go outside during dawn or dusk or go into areas favored by mosquitoes, wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants and use according to package instructions a mosquito repellent containing 20 to 35 percent DEET.

Alternatively, clothing impregnated with permethrin (not directly applied to the skin) can provide up to six to eight weeks of protection.

The DLIFLC AA Degree Program

Summary

Congress authorized DLIFLC in December of 2001 to grant qualified students an Associate of Arts in Foreign Language degree. The Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges/Western Association of Schools and Colleges (ACCJC/WASC) subsequently approved the requirements for this degree on May 1, 2002.

Eligibility

Students must fulfill the DLIFLC **diploma** requirements from either the Basic or Intermediate language program.

Basic program students must achieve a minimum DLPT score of L2/R2/S1+ at graduation.

Intermediate program students must achieve a minimum DLPT score of L2+/R2+/S2 at graduation.

A cumulative grade point average of a "C" (2.0) or higher is required.

Any course grade below a D will disqualify a student from the degree program.

A student may earn a degree in only one language.

General Education Requirements

DLIFLC does not teach all the required general education courses a student needs to receive an AA degree.

Basic language program students need to transfer five lower division courses to DLIFLC.

1. English Composition
2. Natural or Physical Science (course must include a lab and requirement can not be satisfied with a CLEP test)
3. A course in American History, World History, Western Civilization, or American Government
4. A basic introductory computer course
5. A college math course, such as college algebra, precalculus, calculus, geometry

Graduates from the Intermediate language program need to satisfy one additional GED course in the area of Critical Thinking.

All general education transfer courses must be completed with a grade of "C" or higher.

Other Methods of Obtaining College Credit

Credits towards the general education requirements may also be satisfied through Advanced Placement (AP), the College Level Examination Program (CLEP), the Defense Activity for Nontraditional Education Support (DANTES), or for military training as recommended by the American Council on Education (ACE).
